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Triumphant return of abducted Camp 'Liberty' resident

After one month detention Safar Zakery, the Camp Liberty resident who was abducted at

a mock accident scene by forces close to former Iraqi PM, Nori al-Maliki, was returned to the camp after international pressure built up on the Iraqi government. His release showed once again

that our campaigns are successful and together we can prevail.

On 16 March, Mr Zakery, driver of

a Camp Liberty black water tanker, was on his way back to Liberty after emptying the sewage when he was hit

by a Humvee belonging to the Iraqi SWAT forces. The Humvee, travelling at the illegal speed of 60 km/hr, went off course to the left side of the road and hit Safar Zakery's tanker that was

travelling at 20 km/hr on the extreme right side of the road badly damaging

the tanker. Once the traffic police saw the scene of the accident, he declared that the Humvee was the guilty party. Both the policeman riding in the Camp Liberty vehicle, as well as the policeman riding in the tanker that was following a short distance behind, confirmed that the Humvee was to be blamed. But Mr Zakery was detained and numerous attempts to gain his release were blocked by agents related to Maliki.

The international campaign to bring about his release gained momentum over time and demonstrations were held in capitals of major western countries including London and Washington DC.

A publicity advert was printed in the Washington Times 4 days before the Iraqi Prime Minister was due to meet President Obama in the White House. Demonstrations and picket lines in



front of the White House continued nonstop.

One day before the release of Safar Zakery on 14 April, Ad Melkert, former head of the UN mission in Iraq wrote to the US ambassador in Iraq and called on him to act for the immediate release of Mr Zakery who had already missed a long awaited medical appointment for surgery.

Various American congressmen and congresswomen publicly called for the release of Mr Zakery who was deemed as a hostage in the hands of Iraqi forces.

In Britain in a joint statement, Lord Tony Clarke, former chairman of the Labour Party, David Jones MP, former Welsh Minister, Sir Alan Meale MP, Deputy Leader of the Socialist group in the Council of Europe and Conservative MP, Brian Binley, recalled the responsibilities of the UN and the US government based on the Memorandum of Understanding that was signed between them and the Iraqi government and asked for their intervention to free Safar Zakery.

The return of Mr Zakery to Camp Liberty on 14 April highlighted the Lord Clarke of Hampstead CBE

brains to find different ways of reaching people. This concentrated effort at informing people is just what this cause needs, but it isn't easy. Apart from the disproven lies spread about the Ashrafis by the Iranian regime and often naively echoed in our press, the topic of the Middle East as a whole tends to turn people off. It appears in our minds as a huge mess of countless unimaginable tragedies that we can't possibly begin to solve. And also it is played out in a far away land, distant from ours in geography, language and religion.

I recently asked a friend who used to raise funds for the Tibet Society how the money was most successfully raised and he pointed out that it was when westerners started travelling to Tibet and meeting Tibetans themselves, visiting them and staying with them. They would come home with a passion to help the people they had met, and that passion would rub off on others.

It is having a connection to someone which makes you act. Since launching this campaign, I have observed my own

actions (or more likely inactions) to other causes. Let's face it, there are a lot of worthy causes about. I looked at lots of crowdfunder projects when creating my own. I saw plenty that I thought were great causes, some which almost had me pledging, but only one that I actually did pledge my money to. This was a woman who had come up with an initiative to help nomadic herders in Mongolia in a sustainable way. When I was 20 I travelled to Mongolia and spent a magical few days staying with a nomadic family. It had a big impact on me. This was the connection which made the difference between just reading the page, then passing on to the next and actually pledging some money and sharing it with my friends.

The vast majority of the pledges my project has received have been either from people who are involved personally with me, or are already involved with the cause.

This is the way it is, and this is why ILA reach out to the public in such a human way. Their visits to people who have expressed an empathy make that important connection. They share their stories about their families, their lives. It can't be easy telling these heartrending truths over and over, but there is no other option. Without help from any government, they are on their own with their huge task. They have to try every avenue they can. Making a real human connection is the only way to make someone care enough to do something. ILA host regular social evenings where speakers discuss the latest developments. Sometimes an MP will come for Q&A. There is usually some musical entertainment and always delicious Persian cuisine. It is always engaging to talk to the other guests, and the members themselves are such warm and genuine people. After the last one I attended, another guest and I were just getting into our cars when one friend from ILA came running out and said 'wait there'. We waited and he duly came back with two large parcels of yummy food to share with our families when we got back home.

Their gentle, kind approach to their problem and my knowledge of them

over the years has made me feel a deep connection with this subject. This connection has galvanised me into action, and through this campaign I hope to be the link that engages more people with the plight of the people of Ashraf.

'There are millions of people suffering all over the world' is an observation that has been put to me countless times over the last few weeks! I always reply that I feel a connection with these people as they have reached out to me, so I will do what I can. There are some other pretty good reasons though:


The Past: These countries may be far away geographically, but our past is interlinked, and not in a way that shows my nation in a good light. The fact that Iranians have spent the last 30 years

living under a brutal regime is down in part to the meddling of the US and UK governments acting in their own interests, and so it continues.

The Future: It doesn't take a psychic to see that the Iranian regime is an aggressor stirring up trouble across the globe, arming and training terrorist groups, exporting terrorism. This is a threat that affects us all.

The 2700 people in Camp Liberty are widely believed to be capable of bringing about change in Iran. I can't personally help all the millions suffering around the world. But wouldn't helping and safeguarding these people be an ideal place to start?

MARYAM RAJAVI TO US HOUSE SUBCOMMITTEE:

REGIME CHANGE IN IRAN NECESSARY FOR COUNTERING ISLAMIC FUNDAMENTALISM

rs. Maryam Rajavi, the president of the National Council of Resistance of Iran told the U.S. Congress on Wednesday that in the "absence of a firm policy vis-à-vis the regime in Tehran, there will be destructive consequences." To counter Islamic fundamentalists, democratic and tolerant Islam should be empowered, she explained.

Maryam Rajavi appeared before the House Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Terrorism, Nonproliferation and Trade via videoconference on Wednesday.

Rajavi referred to the Iranian regime as the "epicenter of fundamentalism" in the Middle East and she told the assembled Representatives, "We can and we must defeat Islamic fundamentalism, whether Shiite or Sunni."

Maryam Rajavi outlined several practical steps that Western governments might take toward this end, one of which was to "recognise the Iranian people's aspirations to overthrow the mullahs."

She told the hearing: "Today, Islamic fundamentalism and extremism, under the name of ISIS or Shiite paramilitary groups, have launched a vicious assault on countries in the region and beyond including America and Europe."


"Islamic fundamentalism emerged as a threat to peace and security when Khomeini stole the leadership of a popular revolution in 1979 and established a religious dictatorship," she added.

The Iranian opposition leader also said: "For 36 years, we have resisted a religious tyranny and fought for democracy in Iran. The Iranian regime has served as the main source of this ominous phenomenon in the region and across the world. The primary objective of Islamic fundamentalists, including ISIS, is to establish an Islamic Caliphate and enforce Sharia law."

The Islamic fundamentalists "recognise no borders," she said. "Aggressiveness and violence are two common features of Sunni and Shiite extremists. As such, searching for moderates among them is an illusion."

Rajavi said her movement had warned that the mullahs sought to acquire nuclear weapons to export fundamentalism





and guarantee their own existence, but little, if anything, was done to prevent this export.

"Unfortunately, failure to stop the Iranian regime's post-2003 meddling in Iraq enabled it to gradually occupy that country, driving the unprecedented spread of fundamentalism. Similarly, crimes committed by the Quds Force and Bashar Assad in Syria and the massacre and exclusion of Sunnis in Iraq by Maliki, coupled with Western silence, empowered ISIS," she said.

Rajavi emphasized that the mullahs' regime is not part of any solution to current crises; it is indeed the heart of the problem.

"The people of Iran, indeed, call the mullahs' regime as Godfather of ISIS and other fundamentalist groups. The ultimate solution to this problem is regime change by the Iranian people and Resistance," she said.

"This regime is extremely fragile and vulnerable. As evident during the 2009 uprising, the overwhelming majority of the Iranian people demanded regime change. The regime's show of force is hollow and a result of weak Western policy."

"Owing to the pivotal role of the People's Mojahedin Organization of Iran (PMOI/MEK) as a democratic Muslim movement, the Iranian Resistance has established itself as the antithesis to Islamic fundamentalism."



MARYAM RAJAVI TO US HOUSE SUBCOMMITTEE: MULLAHS' REGIME IS GODFATHER OF ISIS AND OTHER FUNDAMENTALIST GROUPS

Rajavi outlined the following practical steps necessary for defeating Islamic fundamentalism:

- Expel the Quds Force from Iraq and end the Iranian regime's influence in that country;
- Enable full participation of Sunnis in power sharing and arm Sunni tribes to provide security for their communities;
- Assist Syria's moderate opposition and people to end Assad's regime and establish democracy in that country;
- Recognise the Iranian people's aspirations to overthrow the mullahs and end inaction vis-à-vis the gross human rights violations in Iran.
- Provide protection for, and uphold the rights of, members of Iran's organized opposition, the MEK, residing in Camp Liberty in Iraq.
- Empower the true, democratic and tolerant Islam to counter fundamentalist interpretations of this religion; and
- Block all pathways for the Iranian regime to acquire nuclear weapons.

Tom Tancredo: I commend my former colleagues for doing the right thing

Tom Tancredo, former Member of the US Congress and a presidential candidate in 2008, in an article published on The Hill website on 29 April wrote:

The House Foreign Affairs Committee has scheduled for Mrs Maryam Rajavi, the Paris-based Iranian opposition leader to address a subcommittee hearing, "ISIS: Defining the Enemy" via satellite, as the first witness. I commend my former colleagues, House Foreign Affairs Committee Chairman Ed Royce and chair of subcommittee on Terrorism, non-proliferation and Trade, Judge Ted Poe for doing the right thing and affording the U.S. Congress the opportunity to examine facts and hear from those in the field, rather than relying only on experts within the beltway. Rajavi's testimony before Congress is long overdue.

Stevenson: Appeasement of Iran regime in nuclear talks a 'huge mistake'



European Iraqi Freedom Association president Struan Stevenson has warned that the lifting of sanctions when the deal is signed on June 30 – as demanded by the Iranian regime's Supreme Leader Ali Khamenei is a 'great compromise which

fundamentally affects our ability to ensure that Iran doesn't cheat', Mr Stevenson told a live Q&A on the Iranfreedom.org website on 27 April.

When asked whether the nuclear deal would stop Iran from acquiring the bomb, he stressed that Iran had cheated on international agreements before and will cheat on them again.

He said the world should not be taken in by the 'good cop, bad cop' routine employed by the Ayatollah Khamenei and Hassan Rouhani, whose 'smiling exterior' has fooled the West

Mr Stevenson also stressed the importance of supporting the Iranian opposition in Iran, and expressed deep sadness and shock at the West's 'betrayal' of the people in Camp Liberty who were individually guaranteed safety by the United Nations, the European Union and the United States.

He said that the only way to end human rights violations in Liberty was for the international community – especially the U.S – to honour its pledge to the 2600 residents.

Iranian opposition leader: Tehran is driving force behind extremism

A top Iranian opposition leader told a House subcommittee Wednesday that Iranians have dubbed their government the "godfather" of the Islamic State militant group.

Maryam Rajavi, president-elect of the Paris-based National Council of Resistance of Iran, also said Tehran wants nuclear weapons to foster Islamic extremism.

"The ultimate solution to this problem is regime change," Rajavi said.

Testifying before a House Foreign Affairs subcommittee via videoconference from France, Rajavi discussed international negotiations underway to get Iran to curb its nuclear program in exchange for the lifting of economic sanctions crippling its economy.

She warned against giving Iran too many concessions, saying it would embolden its leaders to be more aggressive in meddling in other nations.

She said the U.S. and five other nations in talks with Iran must demand that it completely stop enriching uranium and shut down its nuclear sites, missile programs and other programs. While there is no final deal yet, emerging details of an agreement fall short of her demands.

"None of the sanctions should be lifted before an agreement has been signed that effectively and definitively denies the mullahs the bomb," Rajavi said. "Otherwise, the regime will spend billions of unfrozen assets to buy weapons, including advanced missiles from Russia."

70-year-old hanged in Iran after 14 years of imprisonment

On Thursday 23 April, a group of nine men were hanged in Iran including a 70-year-old who had been held in prison for the past fourteen years. The hangings took place at the main prison in the city of Bandar Abbas in the southern province of Hormozgan.

The local judiciary office confirmed the executions but did not identify victims. Human rights activists reported that Heydar Mardani, 70, was among the executed prisoners. He was serving his 14th year of incarceration.



Anti-regime protests held in Ahvaz

Residents of the Iranian city of Ahvaz expressed their rage and loathing against the suppressive and discriminatory policies of the clerical regime in the southern province of Khuzestan by chanting anti-regime slogans following a soccer match on Friday (3 April 2015).

The Iranian regime's suppressive forces engaged with the protesting



people around government institutions. The sound of shots being fired could be heard in these places from a distance. In an earlier demonstration the angry crowd carried signs reading "We are all Youness" referring to Youness Asakereh, a street vendor who set himself on fire protesting repressive measures by regime agents.

He died on 22 March due to severe burns.

Funeral for street vendor turns into anti-regime protest

Youness' self-immolation provoked rage in the people in cities across Iran, particularly in the Khuzestan Province.

Participants at the funeral chanted "We are all Youness", "Freedom, freedom".

Several of the participants at the funeral were arrested afterwards – either in their homes or while returning home from the funeral.



115 executions in two weeks across Iran

The murderous mullahs have sharply increased executions to terrorise the population

The wave of executions across Iran is continuing unabated. The anti-human regime sent another 30 prisoners to the gallows between 22 to 26 April.

On 22 April nine prisoners were collectively hanged in Vakil Abad prison in Shiraz. Sixteen other prisoners were executed in Bandar Abbas, Kerman and

Jiroft on 23 April. Further executions on 25 and 26 April in Rasht, Zanjan and Abhar brought the execution toll of the week to over 30, hence the number of executions in Iran in the two weeks between 13 to 26 April reached 115.

Of course the real number of executed prisoners is much higher than this. According to reports from inside the country, a large number of prisoners have been executed secretly in Arak in recent weeks.



Miners protesting layoffs and low wages were sentenced to flogging and prison

A so-called court in Iran sentenced five protesting mine workers to one year in prison and lashes for 'disturbing public order' during last year's massive protests against layoffs.

Workers at Chadormalu iron ore mine, near Yazd, have been protesting layoffs and low wages. The employers at the mine company introduced the five workers as leaders of the protests and had demanded that they be dealt with harshly.
